Gerald Foster

Dates: 1900-1987

Residency: Westfield, New Jersey. Orangeburg, South Carolina.

Bio: Born in Westfield, New Jersey, Gerald Sarget Foster was a painter and illustrator. He

attended the American Academy in Rome, Princeton University, and the National Academy of

Design in New York. The artist was associated with the American Artists League, where he

exhibited work. Foster also showed his work at the Art Institute of Chicago, the Macbeth Gallery

of New York, and at the Whitney Museum of American Art. Foster was known for his extensive

studies of the Revolutionary War period, which made him a perfect candidate for FDR's Works

Projects Administration. The artist was known for his paintings of boats, which may be why he

was favored by FDR and chosen without much competition for the Poughkeepsie project. The

artist had already painted a post office mural in Freehold, New Jersey before he was chosen to

paint three murals in the Poughkeepsie post office in 1938. The three paintings are titled

Poughkeepsie circa 1692, Hamlet of Poughkeepsie c 1750, and July 26, 1788 New York State

Ratifies the US Constitution in the Dutchess county Court House in Poughkeepsie. Foster

received \$8,000 for the three murals, which is the highest fee paid to an artist in the public

buildings program. The artist died in Orangeburg, South Carolina in 1987.

Major Accomplishments: Post Office murals in Poughkeepsie, New York, Freehold, Cranford,

and Millburn, New Jersey.
