

Background Information




The name "Columbia" comes from the Latin feminine form of the name of it's first white explorer, Christopher Columbus.

Columbia County is in the northern part of the Hudson River Valley, about 125 miles north of New York city and 35 miles south-east of Albany.

It is 36 miles from North to South, and 18 miles from East to West. It contains 688 square miles.

The first exploration of Columbia County was said to be from Henry Hudson in 1609 while sailing across the Atlantic Ocean and up the Hudson River.

Hudson described the surrounding land as "...the finest for cultivation that I ever in my life set foot upon, and it also abounds in trees of every description."

- •Henry Hudson's journal describes, "we found very loving people and very old men, and the natives also brought on board Indian corn, pumpkins and tobacco."
- •At Stockpork Creek (the Mohican village), Hudson exclaimed the area "consisted of of forty men and seventeen women," a well as canoes and, to his astonishment, "a great quantity of Indian corn and beans... enough to load three ships."



The Abraham Staats house (c. 1660s or later), located on the north side of the Stockport Creek near the Hudson River, Stockport.


1657, Major Abraham Staats constructed a fur-trading post and farm on the North side of the Stockport Creek. Staat docked his ship the "Claverack" to take furs and grain which is considered the first European port in the area of Columbia County

By the time of the American Revolution, Clavarack Landing contained a dozen houses, two stores, two wharves, a grist mill, and a ferry to Athens while serving as the port for nearly 800 houses that were 160 square miles along the east side of the Hudson


History, Geographically speaking:

Columbia County was erected on April 4, 1786 by an act through the legislature

- •Seven original towns consisting of Kinderhook, Canaan, Claverack, Hillsdale, Clermont, Germantown and Livingston were erect by an act passed March 7, 1788
- •As new towns formed during the late 1700's and early 1800's there became a total of 18 Currently- Divided into 19 towns now; Ancram, Austerlitz, Canaan, Chatham, Claverack, Clermont, Copake, Gallatin, Hudson City, Ghent, Greenport, Hillsdale, Germantown, Kinderhook, Livingston, New Lebanon, Stockport, Stuyvesant and Taghkanic.
- •Columbia County's land is diversified with hills, plains, and valleys. Columbia County is "farmed from the quantity and quality of its Indian corn, lead and iron."



Detail from Columbia County Historical Society's Penfield Map, 1799. Originally the City of Hudson extended out into the Hudson River with deep bays north and south. As this maps shows, however, the outer edges of the bays were already being filled in to widen the waterfront for commercial purposes.



Clew Staffordsbire China, produced 1829-1836. The scene on this plate was based on Wall's interpretation of South Bay and Mt. Merino. The China set featured eight scenes of the Hudson Valley after the work of Wall.







 Stuyvesant Falls Mill District-grist mill and paper mill, cotton mill, woolen mill complex and extant hydroelectric plant




Columbia County was originally the home to the Mohican Indians. In 1612 parts of the land was colonized. Columbia County was officially founded in 1786 but was first explored in 1609 by Henry Hudson. Columbia County is located southwest of Albany (the capital of New York). The current population is 63,096.

OLANA ESTATES

This is the home of a well-known painter- Frederic Church. Frederic Church's paintings were reflective of his 250-acre estate. The Persianstyle home was built between 1870-1891. Built on a high hill overlooking the Hudson River Valley, to Frederic Church this was known as "the center of the world". Today the home remains unchanged and looks as it did in the 1890s. You will find the paintings and furnishings of Frederic and his family acquired over the years of residency.


