Huguenot Street Lesson Plan

GRADE LEVEL: 3rd

MATERIALS

- Venn Diagram
- Paper
- crayons, magic markers, pencils

LEARNING STYLES

- Visual/Spatial
- Bodily/Kinesthetic

<u>DURATION:</u> Two 30 minute lessons and Field Trip to Huguenot Street

OBJECTIVES

- To be able to identify the architectural structure including techniques and materials of doors, shutters, and hardware.
- To gain an understanding of how architecture has evolved and be able to identify characteristics of 17th and 18th century architecture.
- To be able to use a Venn diagram to record similarities and differences from past to present.

PROCEDURE

- 1. Pre-lesson: the teacher will introduce the lesson through direct instruction to the whole class using a Venn diagram to compare and contrast doors, windows, and hardware found on the school bus and in the classroom to illustrate how to use a Venn diagram.
- 2. During the trip: the teacher will advise students to note similarities and differences between the houses and their own homes paying attention to the doors, shutters, and hardware.
- 3. Students will record observations and draw pictures of their observations during the field trip.
- 4. Back in the classroom students will work in groups of three to record the similarities and differences between the 17th & 18th century homes and their homes using a Venn diagram.
- 5. To summarize the teacher will discuss and list students' observations on the blackboard.

<u>ASSESSMENT</u>: The teacher can grade students on their attentiveness and participation during the field trip, completeness of notes from field trip/discussion, and

completion/accuracy of Venn diagram of architectural differences and participation in post-trip discussion.
