

Wagner wo hundred twenty-five years ago, the Hudson River Valley was the major theater of the Revolutionary War, what George Washington referred to as the "Key to Victory." Each year through 2008, the region will observe Patriots' Weekend to commemorate and to celebrate the War for American Independence. Patriots' Weekend, 2007 will highlight the 225th anniversary of the movements in 1782 from Yorktown, Virginia, to the Hudson River Valley by General George Washington and the Continental Army and General Jean Baptiste Donatien de Vimeur, comte de Rochambeau and his French Expeditionary Corps. The Franco-American journey was an amazing feat of endurance and military achievement with British armies at points along the route. In 1782 the French Army retraced its steps back from Virginia to Boston, Massachusetts, to board ships for the Caribbean; the Continental Army returned for its final encampment at Newburgh and New Windsor, New York.

"THE JOURNEY BACK - THE CROSSING AT KING'S FERRY, 1782"

The Crossing of the Hudson, 1782 will highlight the Washington-Rochambeau Revolutionary Route (W3R) in New York. New York W3R is a project of the Hudson River Valley National Heritage Area, Heritage New York, and the NYS Department of Transportation that has national significance, linking nine states and D.C. from Massachusetts to Virginia to commemorate the considerable contribution that General George Washington and the Continental Army and General Jean Baptiste Donatien de Vimeur, comte de Rochambeau and his French Expeditionary Corps made for American liberty and independence. The route commemorates the French-American campaign in 1781 first to lay siege to General Sir Henry Clinton's army in New York City and later to surround the main Southern British army under General Charles Lord Cornwallis at Yorktown, Virginia, and the return marches in 1782. The actual crossings of some 5,000 French troops took place on September 18, 1782, 225 years ago.
