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War, what George Washington referred to as the "Key to Victory." Each year through 2008, the region will observe Patriots' Weekend to commemorate and to celebrate the War for American Independence. Patriots' Weekend (III), 2007 will highlight the 225th anniversary of the arrival of the Continental Army at New Windsor Cantonment for its last winter encampment as it observed the British army in New York City and awaited peace.

Patriots' Weekend, 2007 New Windsor Cantonment and Brigade of the American Revolution's 45th Anniversary Homecoming

The New Windsor Cantonment is the last encampment made by General Washington's Continental Army before the end of the war. On October 28, 1782, a year after the American victory over the British at Yorktown, Virginia, General George Washington moved his troops to New Windsor for the winter; he had arrived at his headquarters at the Widow Hasbrouck House, home of the late Colonel Jonathan and Mrs. Trynjte Hasbrouck in Newburgh, on March 31, 1782. Some 500 women and children (campfollowers) accompanied his 7,000 troops. They transformed 1,600 acres of forests and meadows into a substantial military enclave or "cantonment." By late December 1782, they had erected nearly 600 log huts. The army would remain until furloughed in June 1783.
